Where are they now? An interview with ex-Highfield student, Elijah Walsh, who is a semi-professional basketball player in the USA.



When did you study at Highfield? Who was the Headteacher? I started in reception around 15 to 16 years ago, when Mr Tindle was the Headteacher. When he retired, Mrs Colley took his place.

Can you tell us about your experience at our school? I had a fun experience at Highfield. Having my dad (Mr Walsh the Superintendent) at school made it pretty easy, especially when I forgot money for fruity Friday or Monday bun day. I tried to get involved in a lot of the activities which made my experience more exciting

What was your favourite subject? Why? P.E because I loved playing sports.

Are there any teachers that you have any fond memories about? If so who and what is/are the memory/ies? It's hard to single out one teacher. I think every single teacher I had, there are many memories that I could talk about. Miss Elson and Mrs Homan were fun teachers as Year 3 and Year 4 were my favourite years. Mrs Garbutt was my first ever teacher. I used to be scared or Mrs Pickles but she gave me smarties if I got a good score on my spellings.

Can you share any specific memories or moments that stand out from your time at our school (trips etc)? I can't remember exactly what the tournament was, but we were on TV during a penalty shoot out. How has our school's education and values influenced your personal growth? Keeping high expectations was something that helped me grow. I remember times I wanted to hand in work and just get it done, but teachers would hold me accountable and make me produce work of a good standard. This rubbed off on me, so now I like to keep myself at a decent standard with school work but also with basketball.

Did you make lasting friendships/are you still in contact with old school friends? There are a few people I talk to here and there, it's difficult as I live on the other side of the world now. I do try to keep up with people if something pops up on social media and I might drop a message and just say, 'Hey how's things?'
