Reception:

This term, Year 1 had a couple special visitors: Cathrine, who came to teach them about Toys and how they have evolved over time, from whipping tops to video games


and Dr Paul who came to talk about his job as working as a Dr for the Yorkshire

When did you study at Highfield? Who was the Headteacher? I attended Highfield Primary School from 1989 to 1996. Mrs Snowden was the headteacher when I first started and when she retired Mr Tindle became headteacher.

Can you tell us about your experience at our school? I have lots of good memories from my time at Highfield Primary School. One of my happiest times was playing football in the playground at break time with my friends. I also remember school assemblies very well when we all gathered to sing songs; the harvest festival songs were my favourite.

What was your favourite subject? Why? Being a big football fan my favourite subject at school was always PE. I loved being active and I still do, I've even played football with Mr Gath! I always enjoyed History at Highfield, I remember particularly enjoying a project whilst in Year 6 about World War 2.



Are there any teachers that you have any fond memories about? If so who and what is/are the memory/ies? I remember whilst I was in Year 4, Mr Tindle was our teacher. He made learning fun and I always enjoyed lessons with him. He also had a strong passion for football and was a big Sunderland fan. I also remember Mr Potter, who I believe has only just retired; Mr Potter played the piano during school assemblies and at after school shows.

Can you share any specific memories or moments that stand out from your time at our school (trips etc)? My most memorable time at Highfield Primary was when I received an award, known as the John Fox effort award. I received this twice, one in reception and the second time in year 4. I was given a certificate and a book. I still have the Ghostbusters story which I now read to my daughter.

One big event that happened during my time at Highfield Primary School was the fire that forced the school to close and it needed rebuilding. During the closure we had to attend another local school. Highfield reopened just before I left in 1996.

I also remember going on two residential school trips to Robin Hoods Bay and Marrick Priory, these were so much fun. We were able to go rock pooling and rock climbing on our trips.

How did our school's extracurricular activities and programs impact your overall experience? There were lots of extra curricular activities but I only ever wanted to play football and this was on a Friday after school. I used to play for the Highfield football team and we got to compete against teams from other schools. Whilst there is no direct link to my job now as an airline pilot, playing football requires some of the same skills including: hand eye coordination, communication, leadership and team work.

How did our school prepare you for your current or future career? In order to qualify as an airline pilot I have had to take a lot of exams and pass a lot of flying tests. To pass these tests I've had to do a lot of studying over the years. Maths and English are a bit part of my job and I began to learn these during my time at Highfield Primary School. I need to read manuals, write reports, calculate the distance we will travel and add up the amount of fuel to take on the aeroplane.

I also need to understand science, again which I started to learn about at Highfield. I have to know about electrical systems and the weather. As you can imagine I have needed a good understanding of Geography too!

Was there a defining moment during your time at this school when you realised what you wanted to do with your life? Ever since I was about 8 years I have always wanted to be an airline pilot. My grandparents lived near the airport and I use to love watching the aeroplanes take off and land with them. I have always made decisions to help me get towards my goal of flying for a career - such as joining the air cadets at 13 years old and making decisions at high school to study subjects that would help me become an airline pilot.

How has our school's education and values influenced your personal growth? I can't remember the exact values that Highfield had when I was a pupil but I do remember the school being very friendly and welcoming. This certainly shaped me as a young boy and to this day I always try to be kind to others and try my best to make people happy. As an airline pilot I have to work as part of a team working mainly with Air Traffic Control, Cabin Crew, Engineers, Baggage handlers and of course other pilots. I have to treat all these people with respect in order to successfully achieve safe flights everyday, so the start in life that Highfield (and my family of course) gave me was very important.

Did you make lasting friendships/are you still in contact with old school friends? Unfortunately I haven't kept in touch with many of my Highfield friends, one of my closest friends from Highfield now lives in Canada and we have managed to keep in touch occasionally but it is hard to meet up!

Can you share any advice or suggestions for current or future students at our school? The best piece of advice I can give to any child at Highfield primary school is to make sure you have fun whilst learning, but also work hard. Make sure you follow your dreams. If you have a job you'd love to do in the future then make it your goal; it's down to you to make it happen!

Would you change anything about your time at Highfield? I don't think I'd change anything from my time at Highfield, I remember my time at the school being happy and I got a great start to my education. I had lots of positive experiences which will stay with me forever.
