Headteacher's Message

I visited Year 5 this week as they have been discussing a very important topic that I believe is crucial to building a fairer and more equal society; **stereotypes**. The children gave a variety of very thoughtful and complex examples: boys can't dance, only girls wear dresses, older people can't be gymnasts, people with disabilities can't do sports. One child addressed the assumptions, generalisations and judgments made about people based on their skin colour as a stereotype – I was impressed at the level of understanding this showed. Together we then thought of those who have proven this stereotype wrong. Listening to children share and debate these views makes me feel so privileged to be in this position where I hear the voices of those who will shape the future.

Understanding why stereotypes are unhelpful we believe is crucial because they can lead to unfair assumptions and biases. Stereotypes reduce individuals to narrow characteristics, ignoring their unique qualities and potential. This can result in limiting opportunities for those who are unfairly judged. By recognising the harm stereotypes cause, we can promote a more inclusive and empathetic society – a society that one day our Highfield children will lead. This awareness encourages critical thinking and fosters respect for diversity. I was so impressed by the mature way in which our Year 5 children discussed and reflected upon what is such a complex topic. Judging by their comments, the future is in good hands.


