

24.02.2025 The Internet and our online safety winners


Thinking time as the children entered the hall, the children were asked to retrieve what these rules were for and why we have them:

Why did we look at these 'Easy rules to remember'?

- Protect personal information
- Stranger Danger
- Think before you Click
- Be Kind
- If something feels wrong, get help

We then took a look at the origins of the internet and the work of **Tim Berners-Lee**, a British computer scientist best known for inventing the **World Wide Web** in **1989**. His innovation completely transformed human communication, opening up a new era of global connectivity and information sharing. He is also one of our Highfield Computing Curriculum heroes!

We then took a look at the world's first ever website which is still available today:





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We then discussed some of the following facts about the internet:

- More than 149,513 emails are sent per minute –
 This means that the number of emails sent each day is ~215,298,720
- Google processes over 8.5 billion searches per day, which is more than 100,000 searches per second.
- In 2025, 518,400 hours of video are uploaded to YouTube every day.
